DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT ... VOLUNTEER!

volunteer – (n) a person who does something without pay; (v) to do something without pay

- Volunteer! Here's a word you'll hear more and more often in Greece. What is a volunteer? And what does it mean to volunteer? Well, more than you might imagine!
- There have always been volunteers. Think of a village. Women used to come together and help a new bride get what she needed for her first house. They gave her tablecloths or blankets or other helpful items. Or perhaps someone in the village became ill and couldn't take care of their family. The church gave a bit of money, and their neighbours brought food to the house, or helped clean or take care of the children until the parents were able to work again. That is the old way of volunteering that we've always done.
- In most modern countries, the government also helps. People pay taxes and the government hires police and teachers. In state hospitals, people may not have to pay much for a doctor. Or if someone doesn't have a job, the government may give them money for a while to help out. In countries such as England and Sweden, this is very common.
- When people live in a city, the old ways of the village may not work so easily. And sometimes, governments can't do as much as people want them to. So, that's where volunteers can help. For example, when the tsunami hit countries around the Indian Ocean in December 2005, many people from all over the world sent money. And a lot of volunteers went there to help give out food and clothing.
- In Greece, volunteers help in many ways. Some people help with athletic events such as the Olympic Games. Others help decorate a place where working mothers can take their young children. Businesses sometimes give money or food to help. Forest fires are put out by EMAC with the help of a large number of volunteer firemen. All this help is given for no pay!
- What do volunteers get back? Some people just feel good when they help. Others learn new jobs as volunteers and can use their experience in future jobs. Whether it's giving out programmes for a small theatre or answering telephones for GreenPeace, most people enjoy making new friends and working together with them to do something good for others.

This can be a friendly letter!


